



Areas of low impact silvicultural systems, which are unsuitable for this type of management due to soft ground conditions and instability, will now revert to clearfell.

Appropriate coupe shapes and phases have been chosen in order to prioritise felling crop prior to wind blow.

Transitional forest/open area will improve the integration of heathland and forest on the upper margins.

More stable area with existing marked seed trees will be retained as a low impact silvicultural system.

Large monocultural areas are being broken up into different coupes in order to restructure the forest.

New road designed to access a young crop in order to facilitate early thinning.
