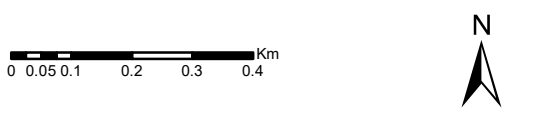

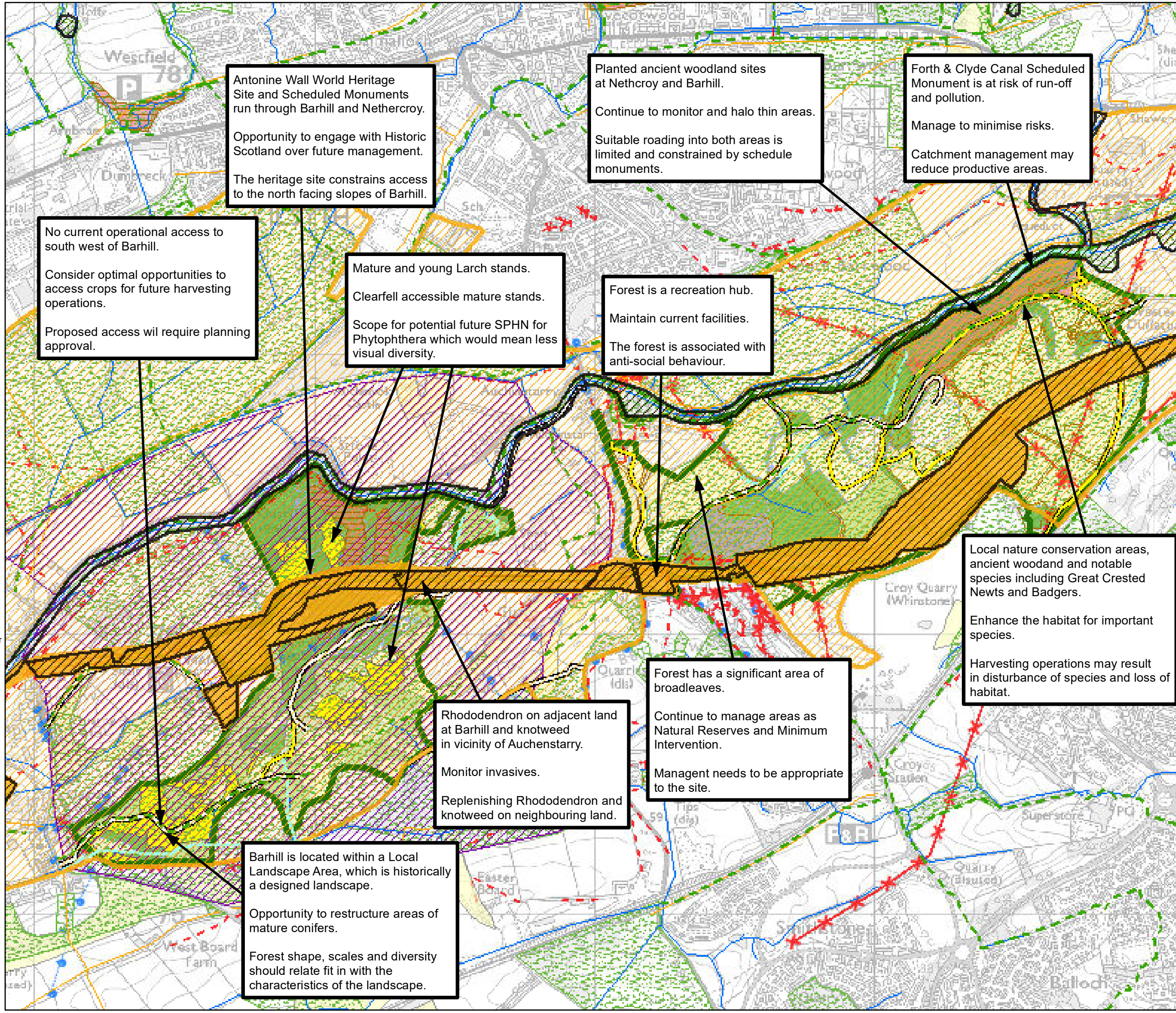

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Antonine Wall World Heritage Site and Scheduled Monuments run through Barhill and Nethercroy.
 Opportunity to engage with Historic Scotland over future management.
 The heritage site constrains access to the north facing slopes of Barhill.

Planted ancient woodland sites at Nethcroy and Barhill.
 Continue to monitor and halo thin areas.
 Suitable roading into both areas is limited and constrained by schedule monuments.

Forth & Clyde Canal Scheduled Monument is at risk of run-off and pollution.
 Manage to minimise risks.
 Catchment management may reduce productive areas.

No current operational access to south west of Barhill.
 Consider optimal opportunities to access crops for future harvesting operations.
 Proposed access will require planning approval.

Mature and young Larch stands.
 Clearfell accessible mature stands.
 Scope for potential future SPHN for Phytophthora which would mean less visual diversity.

Forest is a recreation hub.
 Maintain current facilities.
 The forest is associated with anti-social behaviour.

Local nature conservation areas, ancient woodland and notable species including Great Crested Newts and Badgers.
 Enhance the habitat for important species.
 Harvesting operations may result in disturbance of species and loss of habitat.

Forest has a significant area of broadleaves.
 Continue to manage areas as Natural Reserves and Minimum Intervention.
 Management needs to be appropriate to the site.

Rhododendron on adjacent land at Barhill and knotweed in vicinity of Auchenstarry.
 Monitor invasives.
 Replenishing Rhododendron and knotweed on neighbouring land.

Barhill is located within a Local Landscape Area, which is historically a designed landscape.
 Opportunity to restructure areas of mature conifers.
 Forest shape, scales and diversity should relate fit in with the characteristics of the landscape.
