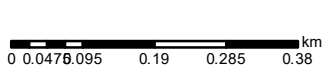

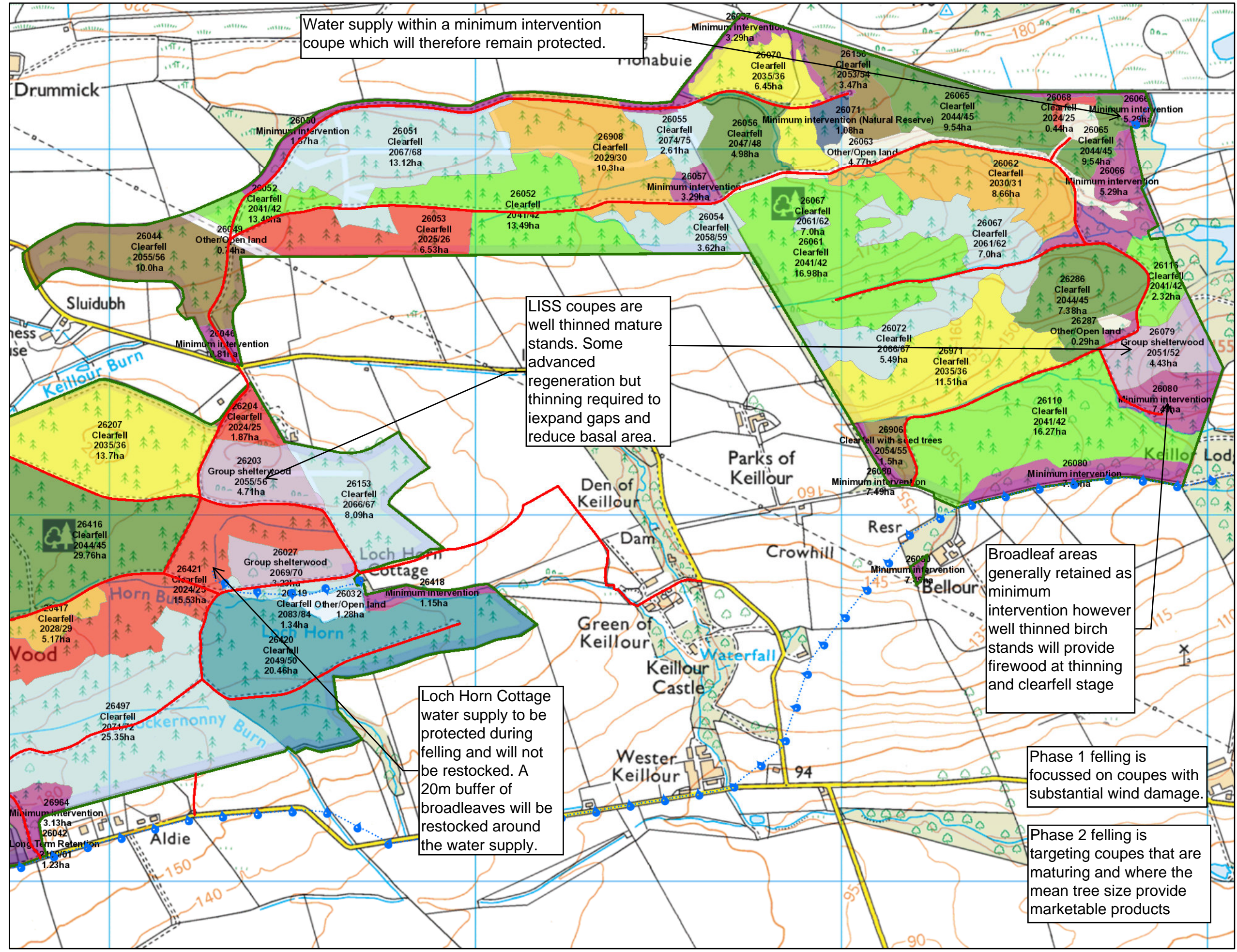

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Water supply within a minimum intervention coupe which will therefore remain protected.

LISS coupes are well thinned mature stands. Some advanced regeneration but thinning required to expand gaps and reduce basal area.

Loch Horn Cottage water supply to be protected during felling and will not be restocked. A 20m buffer of broadleaves will be restocked around the water supply.

Broadleaf areas generally retained as minimum intervention however well thinned birch stands will provide firewood at thinning and clearfell stage

Phase 1 felling is focussed on coupes with substantial wind damage.

Phase 2 felling is targeting coupes that are maturing and where the mean tree size provide marketable products
