



Viewpoint from Ullapool further north

High, straight tree line running parallel with contours is out of character with underlying landform and does not relate to summit, making it appear intrusive in the landscape. Realign when opportunities in felling cycle arise.

Highly visible spur visible over a long distance down Loch Broom, as far away as Coigach.- Felling / planting shapes should appear natural in shape and scale and complement the rugged precipitous slope.

Steep rocky slope above forest: manage forest to keep this slope free of trees to maximise the visibility of the rugged terrain, to reflect the landscape character of the glen and wider area

Whole of slope is visible- ensure all trees including those along upper margin are removed during fellings to prevent narrow strips being left, in particular, near the top of the slope where they would be very visible, draw the eye and detract from the special qualities of the landscape character

Forest garden and tall conifer specimen trees along roadside retains elements of policy woodlands. Very important to distinctive roadside character. Manage to ensure longevity of trees and plant new to ensure feature remains into future.
